Poynton u3a Members Visit New Zealand

Some of you may remember that at the start of the Covid 19 pandemic three years ago my husband and I were in New Zealand and couldn't return home due to flights in and out of New Zealand being cancelled. Undeterred we decided to return in February this year to visit places that we were prevented from going to in 2020. Coincidentally membership secretary Cecilia Storr-Best also decided to fly to New Zealand to watch the English cricket team play New Zealand in two test matches. The first took place in Tauranga on the east coast and the second in Wellington. It was while in Wellington that we were able to meet up for breakfast as we were also staying in the city for a few days.

We had landed in Auckland two days after Cyclone Gabriella hit the North Island. It came after weeks of heavy rain causing flooding, land slips and extensive damage to property. In the city basements were still being pumped out. However, the sun was shining and we set out to enjoy the warm weather. Our accommodation was inside the 1920s built Grand Central station which is now a preserved historic building (pictured on the right).

We then travelled to Wellington aboard the Northern Explorer, a scenic rail trip of 11 hours, passing through diverse landscapes. Before leaving Auckland, we'd heard that an earthquake had occurred under the sea just north of





Wellington but no damage on land was reported. It seems that like most places in the world climate change is very much in evidence here. On the east coast around Hawkes Bay vast areas are covered in mud and timber that was washed down the hillsides. Houses, businesses and crops have been destroyed. This part of New Zealand grows huge quantities of fruit, vegetables and grapes for wine production. This also happened close to harvest time. More heavy rain fell a week later adding to the problem. Roads and rail links have also been damaged as has the water supply, phone lines, electricity lines and internet connections. Food and water had to be delivered by the New Zealand Navy. We certainly seem to pick unfortunate times to visit New Zealand. Did I mention the tornado that struck the east coast? More damage to coastal properties!

Since leaving Wellington we have driven up the west coast for a week by the sea. The area is called The Kapiti Coast. We are mainly exploring the many walking trails including the well-known 'Escarpment Track', a high-level path between two villages. It was very challenging! There were many flights of steps, two swing bridges and a lengthy diversion to avoid a land slip (not recent). Four hours later, foot sore and looking forward to a cool beer, we reached the end of the trail only to find that on Mondays the pub and cafe are closed!

A couple of days later we went to Kapiti Island just off the coast in Paraparaumu. The island is a nature reserve and can only be visited by organised tours by The Department of Conservation. After an interesting talk by a ranger whose Maori great, great grandmother moved onto the island in 1906 to farm it, we walked up through native bush to a view point. There was a lot of birdsong en route but they were hard to see through the dense foliage. After returning to the visitor centre, we were served a hot lunch which we ate inside due to a parrot-like bird, a Kaka, being partial to visitors' lunches! They can even lift the flaps of bags in search of food! Our rucksack was targeted because we'd left the wrapper of Magnum Classic ice cream in the outside webbing pocket! So far, an eventful trip and still more plans for the weeks to come, weather permitting.

Science & Technology Meeting Venue


The Science & Technology meeting in February had an unusual venue in Poynton. Do you recognise it?

NECN Open Groups

You will no doubt remember that Poynton u3a is a member of the NECN (North East Cheshire Network) group of u3as along with Bramhall u3a, Cheadle Hulme u3a, Cheadle & Gately u3a, Wilmslow u3a and Macclesfield u3a. The NECN recognises **Open Groups** which are Interest Groups organised within a particular u3a but open to all members of the u3as in the NECN. The idea is that the membership of an Interest Group may be increased once it has become an Open Group. With the advent of Covid, communication within the NECN virtually ceased.
