Chairman's Remarks

Our AGM in March was very well attended and Poynton U3A now has a new committee operating under its new constitution, which was agreed last September. The initial period of office for all the new committee, the officers and the committee members, is now the same, namely 3 years and details of the committee are given on this page.

Those of you who attended the AGM also received a presentation by Malcolm Adams, Poynton's Town Clerk. Malcolm introduced and expanded on the *Welcome to Poynton* Video, which was commissioned last year, and also took the opportunity of providing an update on what was happening in Poynton over the next few months, including alterations to the Civic Hall.

Despite the attractions of gardening and walks on a very pleasant spring afternoon, our General Meeting in April attracted considerable interest. Chocolate has probably held a life-long attraction for many of us and here was an opportunity to hear *The True History of Real Chocolate*. Mike Clarke did not disappoint us. His knowledge and enthusiasm for the subject allowed him to speak and maintain the interest of his audience for some 45 minutes.

Most of his audience would have been heartened by his thesis that real chocolate was actually very good for you. The secret of real chocolate was the high quantity of cocoa solids with its beneficial antioxidants. However, some manufacturers diluted their chocolate considerably with less expensive materials such as vegetable oils and fats. So – as with most foods which we buy today, we need to read the small print of the contents.

Finally, I would recommend to you all the *Poynton Update and News* which is available in print at the Civic Hall for those who don't have access to the Council's website.

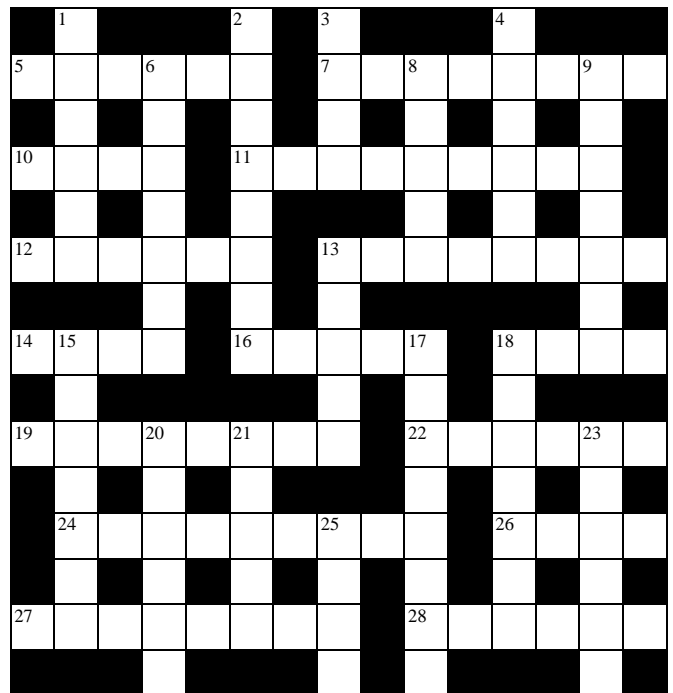
